Rubric for QUESTIONS 12 and 20

- Although a learner's content might be off the topic, the teacher still has to award a mark for language structure and use.
- When a teacher assesses a learner's piece, two marks should be awarded: the first for content and the second for language structure and use. These marks should be added up to form the final mark.
